
Do you know who you're working for?

Security professionals have become attractive proxies for those who wish to harm the UK. Your specialist skills, access to information, and proximity to individuals of interest are attributes that hostile actors wish to exploit.

Working for a foreign power is not illegal but, through the National Security Act 2023, it is now a criminal offence to do so where you are assisting them in work that damages the UK.

The UK Home Office has published new guidance to support the security industry in understanding how to protect itself from approaches by state actors, or those working on their behalf.
